"When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers which you have ordained, the moon and the stars that you have established; What are human beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?... Yet, Thy dost crown us with Thy glory and honor. " — Psalm 8:3

This Advent settle yourself below the stars or at least imagine yourself there and consider your place. Be nestled below the age-old shadows of want and waste of potential. the arch of the sky strung with stars and the deepness of dark. Get a good glimpse of the Holy.

During Advent ponder what an advent is. Advent, adventus simply said, means something is coming. In this case, it is not the advent of the new iPhone or the trendiest fashion. It poor. The streets filled with ragged people were real to is the chance for hope, peace, joy and love to break open. We will always think, wonder and wait. Yet, we have a God who wonders with us as far and as deep and as high as we wander and yet, sees our place of importance regardless of our wavering. Way before we got to our wondering, the power of tender kindness and deep compassion swooped, held humanity fast and cradled us all into the infinite bright lights who would somehow become the descendants Abraham dreamed for one ancient starry night. Eugene Petersor describes this as living into life. "Live into this," he urges. "This is what it looks like to be human in this God-made and God-ruled world; this is what is involved in becoming and maturing as a human being. We don't have to fit into prefabricated moral and mental or religious boxes before we are admitted into the company of God. We are taken seriously just as we are and given place in his story — for it is, after all, God's story."

God's unfolding narrative is as old as those starry skies. We sometimes have an opportunity to witness to the Creator's capacity to cast rays on most anyone near the Light of the world. In enters Charles Dickens, an activist who illuminated social reform by reaching a class of prosperous people who at the time viewed poverty as a faulty flaw. For Charles it was not the stillness nor the starry night that caused him to

see God, but the light of strong human faces hanging with

While strolling the dark streets of London for 15 to 20 miles nightly, Dickens was concerned with plummeting book sales and a fifth child on the way. It's thought that scenes of A Christmas Carol came alive here, among the poorest of the Dickens as was the injustice. After an 1843 speech, Dickens threw away the idea of using politically charged pamphlets to call for social reform, instead using his imagination, A Christmas Carol was printed and intentionally sold where people of means bought hundreds of copies. "Ragged Schools" and a safe house for women opened, Urania Cottage saved women from the streets and child the 1844 Factories Act decreed children 9 to 13 years old would have their work days reduced to 9 hours, 6 days a week. "This was regarded as a humane reform."

A Christmas Carol lights stages even today, shedding light in new places and spotlighting hearts that break open to a gentler world rewritten with hope, peace, joy and love is the advent of Christmas and uniquely God's. The birth and life of Jesus illuminates the first Advent and as Dickens is quoted. "It is good to be children sometimes, and never better than Christmas, when its mighty Founder was a child Himself." A child who is the founder of humanity, of those mammoth light shows across a night sky and of bold, compassionate ways that shape the very lives we live and pray. "When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers which you have ordained, the moon and the stars that you have established; What are human beings that you are mindful of them? It's Advent."
