Let there be ... skylights!

One of the beautiful aspects of White Bear Lake United Methodist Church is our ample natural light provided by our five skylights. We have two large skylights; a pyramidshaped one over the Narthex and a flat (yet slanted) skylight over the stairs. We also have three small pyramid-shaped skylights - two in the main hallway and one in the Christian Education wing.

As beautiful as these skylights are, they have reached their full life expectancy and

need to be replaced. In fact, they have outlived their 10-year warranty by almost three times that! Perhaps you've noticed a bucket or two in the Narthex on a rainy day? Well, thanks to a generous gift from the estate of Bob and Betty Doyle, combined with a loan from Bremer Bank, we will replace all five skylights between July 11 and 22.

The project is being managed by the Trustee committee and the office. The work is scheduled to take place during the regular work week, which means Sunday worship should not be affected.

If everything goes to plan, the only notable inconvenience will be during the week of July 18. That's when they will be replacing the large, flat skylight over the stairs, which will block access to the education wing. All classrooms and the nursery can be reached via the elevator to the first floor, then climbing the stairs near the emergency exit and coming back down the hallway to the room you need. This means the upstairs Christian education wing — including the nursery— will not be fully accessible, so please plan accordingly. If you prefer, the office will be happy to reschedule you into a different room of the building that week. Why an Interim Pastor?

When a pastor has been in place as long as Bryce, the church invariably takes on that pastor's personality and work style. Adjusting to the personality and style of a new Lead Pastor can be challenging; too often that adjustment does not go well. When that happens, the new pastor becomes an "unintended" interim. Within two to three years they are gone. David is called an "intentional" interim. His role is to intentionally guide the church into the appointment of a permanent Lead Pastor. David's tenure is expected to be 11 months.

Why a Lutheran Pastor?

Simply put, there are very few experienced United Methodist interim pastors in Minnesota. The pool of experienced interim pastors in the Lutheran Church is much larger. White Bear Lake UMC is a vital church in the Minnesota Annual Conference. The Conference is bringing in the most qualified candidate available into this role.

The story of a smaller bread oven

Over the past six years, since the development of our Bread Oven Ministry, we have learned many things about planning and executing events using our beautiful oven. One of those things is that it takes the same amount of wood and time to heat up the big oven for a small bread-baking or pizza event as it does for a large one. Since we have started hosting many small events the idea of a smaller oven that would take less time — and wood began to take shape.

Through funding support from memorial gifts, we've commissioned the construction of a small oven that can be fired up in two hours and ready to bake pizza. After only four hours of heating, bread can be baked.

Two of the other goals we have for this oven construction project are documenting all of the construction steps and confirming our cost projection of \$1,800. With this information, we can provide assistance to other organizations interested in having an oven but have limited funds.

If you're interested in having a wood-fired oven in your backyard you should follow the construction of this oven - or, better yet, sign up to help build it!
