Jesus, the Storyteller

Call to mind your own stories and the people who tell them. we hold our lives open to helping yet challenges us and Stories are a history carried by ordinary people, and even if humorous they initiate honor and worth. Perhaps there is an image of a welcoming lap, a patient voice and the invitational wonder of the story unfolding between a familiar it simple, complex, dramatic, romantic, humorous or historical? It's a fact: People of any age love a story. I am betting that you have significant people who are forever written into the pages of your life. Whether they are a friend, a partner or a parent, their story gives us honor.

Jesus stood on mounds, echoed across meadows and walked clay roads delivering stories. In fact, one-third of His teachings are parables. I wonder what made people listen? Most certainly the ancient culture brimmed with tasks and to-dos that sustained a mere living; nevertheless, they listened, and so do we.

Jesus was once asked why He spoke in parables. He replied "so the kingdom of heaven might be given..." Centuries later we tilt our heads to listen longer, to discover a resemblance of a more heaven-like world. Historians believe a portion of why Jesus carved out parables was to elicit divergent points of view and memory. Parables grab us because as soon as we assume we understand the themes of the story, there is more to imagine. Parables have a simple and yet complex pattern. For instance, is the Seed and Sower describing how to become "fertile ground," or is it about our Creator who abundantly and recklessly sows seed our way even when we overlook growing? Or maybe the Sower is about how we might continue to earnestly sow and lean toward others who stand in rockier places.

The Lost Coin, the Lost Sheep and the Woman Baking with Leaven guestion our capacity to notice what is small and ponder how we foster growth. The Good Samaritan asks if

pries us open if we might be thinking of ourselves or others as not worthy of this comfort. Mother Teresa pondered: "We sometimes think that poverty is only being hungry, naked and homeless. The poverty of being unwanted, untone and the love of the teller. What's your favorite story? Is loved and uncared for is the greatest poverty. We must start in our own homes to remedy this kind of poverty."

> We might assume we have leaped over mountains in terms of communicating with one another when we recount the time and place Jesus lived. Even so, a story is ageless. Princeton neuroscientist Uri Hasson has learned that when we listen, our brains are actually wired to couple with one another. Magnetic resonance images reveal similar brain patterns as we each relate to the same experience within a story. When your neocortex lights for a story, mine does too. When your insula activates, mine does too. Stories help us simultaneously experience joy, devotion, pain and ambition. Line by spoken line, our waves actually sync with one another. Stories can escort us to not merely be moved, but to be moved together or, as Hassan describes, "to be greater than all of our parts."

> Jesus the storyteller not only has the most patient of voices, He carves out an eternal invitation within the threads of a parable. The greatest thing about these stories is that you, and your Creator, your counselor, your friend and your Abba or Mom are central to every single story. A parable is an invitation almost as great as a lap to be immersed in. Tell a story, turn a page and write a fresh sentence in a new day. You are wired to be a part of a whole, touching this world for good.
