And awe came upon everyone Acts 2:43

We can be awed by the signs of life near us. The sparrow's song, the healing we did not expect, the confirmation of new faith and the passing of someone who lived largely summon us to try out new lenses upon our ordinary eyes. These experiences call us to find our own focus and see a vision of ourselves and others as new creations. It is staggering to realize that we might have been near to someone and have actually rubbed shoulders not with our do-good holiness, but their holiness. We only have to pause a second to imagine how Jesus grew into this larger light by becoming more memorably unlike His world. Jesus, prophetically praised pearls, sought lost stuff and planted seeds into the lives of ordinary eyes like mine and your's. Once again capture the unpolished, unedited, real Jesus, stooping to anoint farmers into disciples, funny that you should show up right now.' And I say, 'Why?' scouring ragged toes and imparting stories of a God who recklessly sows seeds over any soil. It is Jesus who told that timeless parable of The Sower, claiming things still grow things like people. Like a dandelion's feathery silk seeds move randomly in new tufts of diverse pattern, new creation blows our life open. Anointments are like this.

The prophetic voice of Father Boyle of Los Angeles, author of G-DOG and the Homeboys and other titles and whose work inspired Homeboy Industries, reminds us of renewal. Homeboy Industries is an inner-city gang intervention or a group of industries including cafés, silk screening, a retail store, a catering service, counseling, GED classes and more for people at their beginnings. Boyle's books, public speaking and living remind us of how we might begin to capture the earth seeded in new hopeful patterns. Boyle states in an interview with Krista Tippett of On Being: "Well lately, I've been reading the Acts of the Apostles really carefully. And if you start to read it and think it's kind of a quaint snapshot of the earliest Christian community, that's one thing. But what if you were to read it as a measure of the health of any community? So you see how they love one another, need nothing ... But my favorite one is - it leapt off the page to me. It says, 'And awe came upon everyone,' so that the measure of our

compassion lies not in our service of those on the margins, but in our willingness to see ourselves in kinship. And so that means the decided movement towards awe, and giant steps away from judgment. So how can we seek a compassion that can stand in awe at what people have to carry, rather than stand in judgment at how they carry it? I think that's sort of the key here ... "

Father Boyle recalls how God began to call him to this wider community: "I can remember walking in the projects late at night, long ago, and there was this kid, Mario, sitting by himself, 16 years old, just sitting on his little stoop in front of the crummy old projects. So I see him, and I greet him: 'Hey, how you doing?' And I sit down next to him, and he goes, "'t's 'Well, I was just sitting here praying, and I said, "God, show me a sign that you're as great as I think you are." And then you showed up.'

"Well, I just think — I remember how moved I was by that. And it's how you enter into the vastness and the spacious place that God holds. But it came by way of knowing that the day won't ever come when I am as holy as the people I'm called to serve; that the day won't ever come when I have more courage, or am more noble or am closer to God, than this 16-year-old ... sitting alone on his porch."

We may not start an inner-city ministry; however, it's likely that the God of spacious vastness and open space will let a spattering of Acts 2 awe come upon us. We may sense the blowing of God or not; no matter, God is still there surrounding this place and you cultivating a way for growth. It's significant to note that small budding starts are still growth. You may be in a place of loss, absorbing slim slices of warm light or as prolific as those familiar saffron dandelions. Whispered into the holy pages of life; seeds are being anointed and seeds will grow: "I will plant them so they can grow...They will be my people and I will their God. This is because they will return to me with their whole hearts." Jer. 24:6-7 J.Jacot
