Saints

Rotating around the vast circumference of the world there are stories of lives that matter. Nevertheless, the gift had transformed the scope of her life. As the wise truth in the telling of All Saints Day is that each of us matter and render a common capacity to inspire change. Some of us will recall saints who have left their echoes sounding into the whole of us and this place too. One of the outstanding attributes of hopefilled living is to become mindful of others who launched you forward. This is one of many stories that perhaps will bring to mind someone who inspired, cradled and cared for you.

Marci would be the first to self-acclaim she was born to "poor folk" who made their living near the earth and its seasons. As she repeated her story it became easy to develop an imaginary 1920s-style farm in rural Michigan you might wish you could be immersed like a child leaping into the leaves on an autumn day. The children manned a road side stand near the house chucked with strawberries in the spring, eggs always and piles of produce at harvest. The 1920s heaped the opposites of both bounty and extreme thin scarcity which bulged with the lessons of life as prize and treasure. Marci and her family were less than wealthy, but as we know in the deepest beat of our hearts, wealth holds its own hazy borders.

Marci's wealth was shaped in an exceptional brightness enabling her to graduate early with honors. The principal of her school gave Marci a scholarship, which he and his wife personally funded to allow her to begin her first year at university. In her late years because the "late years of life" seem to come before we

anticipate, Marci would remark that endorsement and proverb describes, "A gift opens the way and ushers the giver into the presence of the great." (Prov. 18:16) Marci's eyes would dazzle despite the heavy lenses and her conversation would drift to the excitement of science and being lifted from the ground in the weather blimp where she calculated samples. And as you may be guessing, it would conclude with the principal and his wife who gave her flight.

I sometimes wonder what transformative moment we would hold and savor that could withstand the finiteness of time. Who endorsed you, who adored you and who might be whittled into the grains of your future? Renowned writer and theologian Henri Nouwen might define saint living-like this.: "Did I offer peace today? Did I bring a smile to someone's face? Did I say words of healing? Did I let go of my anger and resentment? Did I forgive? Did I love? These are the real questions. I must trust that the little bit of love that I sow now will bear many fruits, here in this world and the life to come."

We live in hopefulness while being somewhat blind to prefigure our exact future. We are hopeful that as a community of Jesus-followers we can rearrange how we define our own shadowy echoes into a time we will not see. Jesus-living is allowing our soul to reflect on our own generosity, but to also affirm the wealth of our soulful inner gifts, the strength of the faces who have endorsed and loved us and the launchings that have given us flight. "So let each one give as he purposes in his heart..." Amen. J.Jacot
