-social norms have tilted for the worse. Like an old yearbook, a mildewed photo or last year's bird's nest, has the speaks of a new lens to visualize heroes of hope. world truly become a remnant left aside from some enlightened golden age? Are heroes only in the past?

I wonder if we have forgotten the dream scribed into the most familiar prayer inspired by Jesus. The Our Father asks, maybe begs or pleads, "might My kingdom come?" Some of us are still dreamers and perhaps once more there is a vison worth climbing into the cocoon of.

Jesus dreamed for us by inviting us to be new in Christ, to care more deeply for the stranger and to expansively consider who might be a neighbor. Jesus hoped, Jesus lived and lives with eyes that saw beneath the surface-v stuff of status, beauty and gloss. Our sermons as of late remind us of lit nameless faces, yet heralding story tellers, heroes if you will, in the stories of Jesus, of immigrants, new communities and the sacred welcome to the least. Human stories that echo into this time — each portraying hope. Theologian Bob Benson explains it this way. "The One who came said to religious folks and all the rest. "The kingdom does not come at some future time and place, it's already here. It is within you and all around you and you do not see it or hear it." Picture Jesus nurturing you for just a moment: "You are of God, little children, and have overcome: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world."

Seeing our world as a worthy kingdom can be daunting, but it is available if we place on new lenses or if you will,

> "There are so many beautiful lives and so much goodness, spiritual geniuses of everyday, below the radar of what we see...we are becoming trained to not treat that seriously... Our world is abundant with guiet, hidden lives of beauty and courage and goodness. There are millions of people at any given moment, young and old, giving themselves over to service, risking hope, and all the while ennobling us all."

Might I tie up these threads within a remnant of hope worth examining? I would like to speak specifically of our church and tug a name from the past into the present. Over this summer some folks simply prayed for one another in the Sightline Prayer Project. Overwhelmingly people who participated believe their day was enriched by "being a part of a family of God and a foundation of friendship." The name from the past is President Woodrow Wilson, admired by some but imperfect to others: either way, he shares an idea worth closing with: "We grow great by dreams. All big men [women] are dreamers. They see things in the soft haze of a spring day or in the red fire of a long winter's evening. Some of us let these great dreams die, but others nourish and protect them, nurse them through bad days till they bring them to the sunshine and light which come always to those who sincerely hope that their dreams will come true." 




