

The measure of forgiveness

“Love is an act of endless forgiveness, a tender look that becomes a habit.” — Peter Ustin

She stood between her desire to love generously and her desire to plainly justify hate. The bridge to settling somewhere better seemed to be blown away into the broken places that out lives go. We twirl around the scenario in our mind one way, only to turn it inside out the opposite. We humans hold these opposing quandaries — hard worn, scraped like the barn wood our bare feet slide across hoping to step toward a bit of common ground. Forgiveness can be a difficult bridge to cross.

Mathew 18 alters the “math of forgiveness.” We are offered boundless sums of forgiveness whether we hope to estimate the sum of 7 x 70 or place ourselves as king or debtor. Consequently, “followers of the way” of Jesus are placed upon bridges toward giving without keeping track. Yet, how might we navigate forgiveness with our human hearts?

The Bible is no easy book; rather, it is one that asks you to make your way forward. The Shepherd asks us to keep walking the dry deserts where the cyprus trees seem to bend and wave while other trees are heavy laden with harvest. Living in forgiveness is finding a bridge, a more refined passage because you seek something better even when we’re moving with legs that wobble. We somehow grab onto a sense of Immanuel, God with us and begin to reach out. It is suffering through the wrongs and the rights of a thing and coming out on the sturdiness of a bridge that is in the end the highest ideal — because it is life-giving.

The shores where Peter and the disciples received forgiveness, demonstrate an abundant forgiveness. If there

would have ever been a time to doubt another’s goodness it would have been then for Jesus. Contrastingly, Jesus declares from the upper room to the impromptu fish picnic, “I bring you peace, but please feed my sheep.” Jesus envisions and expects more of us through our failures to love as a means to heal our broken passage ways.”

Joseph Addison once described, “I do not believe that sheer suffering teaches. If suffering alone taught, all the world would be wise, since everyone suffers. To suffering must be added mourning, understanding, patience, love, openness and the willingness to remain vulnerable.” Likewise, Paul Anderson writes: “Forgiveness is a difficult and noble action — not a weak one, not a surrender or a capitulation. Of course, we can confuse it with giving in, with giving up our standards or principles, as tantamount to forcing amnesia. That kind of coercive denial could never be healing. Forgiveness is not a single action, but a process. By forgiving those who harmed us, we do not pretend that what harm they caused did not happen, or that it did not hurt. We can see that chronic resentment stands in the way of love. The bitterness that arises from a long-held wrong, gone over and over, encases the heart, making it difficult for love to get through.”

Jesus wanted love to get though as the highest of needs as well as the highest of callings. Might the grace of forgiveness land us on a bridge of wholeness and might we seek that tender look of forgiveness that becomes a habit. Amen.

The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant
“For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, ‘Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.’ And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt.

But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow-slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, ‘Pay what you owe.’ Then his fellow-slave fell down and pleaded with him, ‘Have patience with me, and I will pay you.’ But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he should pay the debt. When his fellow-slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place.

Then his lord summoned him and said to him, ‘You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow-slave, as I had mercy on you?’ And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he should pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.”

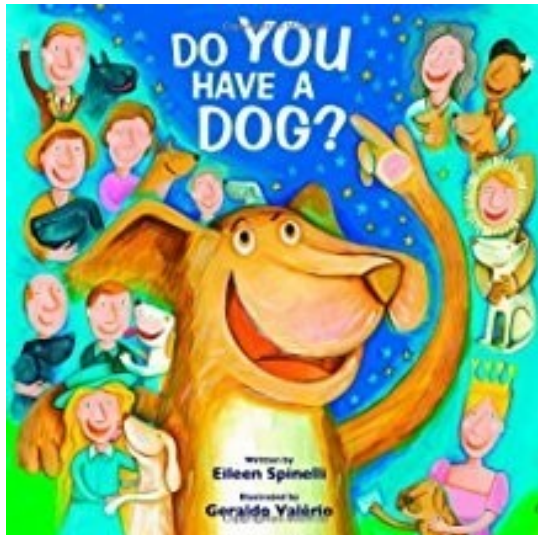
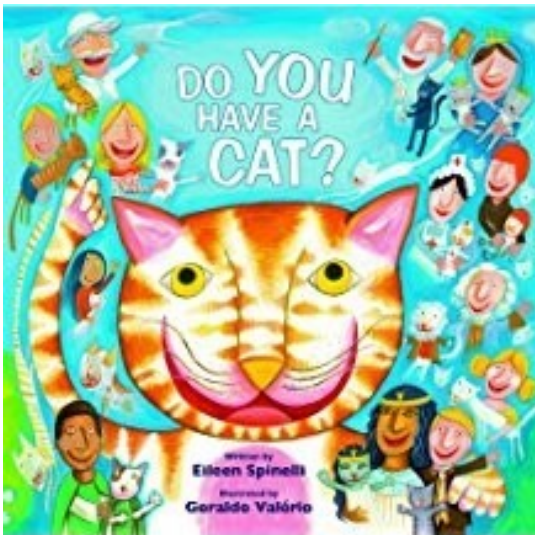
