"UP and OUT of POVERTY" COMMON HOPE

LIFE IN GUATEMALA

Despite the country's beautiful landscapes and joy-filled people, living in Guatemala is challenging:

- More than half its 17+ million citizens live below the national poverty line; 25% live in extreme poverty earning less than \$2/day.
- For families living in poverty, education takes a back seat to earning a living: survival comes first! In Guatemala, the average number of completed years of education for adults is 3.5 years. Only 70% of children graduate from sixth grade, 32% from junior high and a mere 18.6% from high school.
- Access to health care is a challenge with only nine doctors for every 10,000 people. Care is cost prohibitive for many. Major causes of death still include treatable illnesses such as pneumonia, diarrhea and malnutrition. Malnutrition is a serious issue among children.
- Inadequate housing affects learning and health. Many people live in inadequate, unsafe conditions with 67% living in homes without roofs and sufficient living space. Homes in rural areas are crafted from scrap metal. It's also common to see homes built with cornstalk walls and dirt floors. Many dwellings don't have potable water or sanitation systems. These conditions lead to parasitic food contamination, life-threatening disease and family strain.

For these reasons, Common Hope has spent 30+ years partnering with children and families in Guatemala to help students gain a high school diploma and families break the cycle of poverty through education,

health care, housing, and family development. Common Hope strives to be a bridge to the resources and services needed to overcome the challenges facing families, and it's working: Common Hope students are graduating at three to four times the Guatemalan national average!

In the Beginning ...

In 1986, Minnesota natives Dave and Betty Huebsch became involved in human development planning in Guatemala and founded and incorporated "The Godchild Project" as a Minnesota Non-Profit Organization. Following Betty's untimely death in 1989, Dave was joined by his son John working directly with the poorest of God's people in the highland villages in Sacatepequez, Guatemala. The organization was renamed "**Common Hope**" in 1992 and over the course of the next seven years John designed and constructed many of the permanent structures of Common Hope in and around Antigua, including the Family Development Center.

What does 30 years of HOPE look like?

- 1991: Programming expands to include Health Care, Housing, Social Work Services.
- 1994: First "Vision Team" hosted in Antigua.
- 1996: First high school graduate sponsored by Common Hope.
- 1999: New Hope Village construction begins and serves as home for victims of Hurricane Mitch.
- 2004: 500 homes have been built and 200 Vision Teams have traveled to Guatemala.
- 2006: Antigua Clinic celebrates 10 years of service to the community.
- 2010: Common Hope develops a new education model called the PARTNER SCHOOL PROGRAM.
- 2011: 1,000 high school graduates!
- 2013, Early Literacy and Reading programs are launched.
- 2016: 30 Years of Hope celebration!
